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Government Update

CANADA AND MANITOBA MAKE SIGNIFICANT STIMULUS INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT

Funding Will Create Jobs, Boost Local Economy

Winnipeg, Manitoba, September 11, 2009 – The Honourable Vic Toews, President of the Treasury Board and the Member of Parliament for Provencher, and the Honourable Ron Lemieux, Minister of Infrastructure and Transportation, today announced that communities across Manitoba will benefit from more than \$55.9 million in joint federal-provincial investments for key infrastructure projects worth more than \$83.2 million, thanks to a partnership between the governments of Canada and Manitoba. Funding for shovel-ready infrastructure projects is made available under the new Infrastructure Stimulus Fund, part of Canada's Economic Action Plan.

"Under the leadership of Prime Minister Stephen Harper, our Government is stimulating the economy and creating jobs for Canadians," said Minister Toews. "We understand the importance of investing in roads, bridges and other infrastructure to ensure Manitoba communities remain competitive and prosperous. We want to continue to work with the Government of Manitoba to deliver solid results for Manitobans."

"Our government believes that by investing in municipal infrastructure and projects that strengthen our communities we are building a better future for Manitobans," said Minister Lemieux. "The funding we are announcing today will improve things like our roads, water treatment systems and community centers, but it will also create jobs and help our economy grow."

The Government of Canada's funding is being provided under the national \$4 billion Infrastructure Stimulus Fund and is aimed at getting shovels in the ground for infrastructure projects across Canada that can be materially completed by March 2011. Today's announcement includes 74 new infrastructure projects in Manitoba that will receive \$27.3 million from the federal government and \$28.7 million from the provincial government under the Infrastructure Stimulus Fund. The remaining \$27.2 million will come from municipalities or other sources.

The Government of Canada's Economic Action Plan is accelerating and expanding the existing federal investment of \$33 billion in infrastructure with almost \$12 billion in new infrastructure stimulus funding over two years.

Today's announcement continues the important steps the Province of Manitoba is taking to support economic growth by investing \$1.6 billion this year, into infrastructure to stimulate the economy, create jobs, and renew the province's roads, schools, health facilities, and water treatment facilities.

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Grandmother Florence Hamilton

Was nominated by the Northern Association of Community Councils for the Keeping the Fires Burning Honouring Grandmothers Recognition ceremony.

Florence Hamilton, known as "*Granny*" to the community of Wabowden, is a member of the Cross Lake First Nation. (Florence's mother, in fact, was one of three sisters that began the community of Wabowden.) At 91 years of age, Florence has 17 children, and close to 200 grandchildren (including great grandchildren and great-great grandchildren) the majority of whom she delivered!

Florence is well respected in Wabowden for her skills as midwife and was given the gift of midwifery by her auntie Emma Colombe; Florence often assisted in deliveries and delivered her first baby by herself at the age of 17. She has since passed on the knowledge of midwifery to her own granddaughter.

Florence has a lot of faith, knowledge, strength and intuition. With her intuition, she is able to protect her family and the community from many challenging situations. She has the ability to know what's going to happen and can tell you why it happened and how to deal with it.

She has overcome many hardships in her lifetime, including losing two husbands and surviving breast cancer. Florence knows that overcoming obstacles can make you a stronger person.

Florence's stated philosophy is "that everyone is put on this earth for a reason." Her role of teaching and passing down knowledge to her family and community is the reason for her long and meaningful life. She still sews, crochets and knits blankets and cushions. She also makes handmade mukluks and moccasins for her family and friends. Florence was a great jigger in her younger days and still today she loves to dance. Her door is always open and makes herself available o teach anybody that wants to learn.

My name is Chandler McLeod (me) for Introductions. I have been with NACC for almost 2 years as the Eastern-Vice-Chairperson, Council Member for the Incorporated Community of Seymourville for over 2 years.



I belong to a number of Boards including the Model Forest in Pine Falls and North Eastern Health Association as a representative for the new culture aspect at the Pine Falls Hospital. Along the way I have met many of the Mayors and Councillors from all over Manitoba. I take this position with NACC very serious, as NACC stands for the people of Manitoba.

lose them to drugs and alcohol. The lack of Rec Facilities and Equipment in most of our communities is a concern to me. Housing in all of the NACC Communities is below standards.

I hold a Life-Skills Coach training certificate, counseling 1 and 2. I have done Culture Programs throughout Manitoba. I am an Aboriginal Artist and consider myself as a traditional person.

At this time I would like to express my gratitude to the Staff of NACC, NACC would not run without their expertise and is always a nice place to come to with warm smiles and laughter. I would also like to thank the people of Manitoba, along with Aboriginal & Northern Affairs. Thank you to the Board for putting up with me. Well this is my introduction and I look forward to meeting with all of you.

Northern Healthy Foods Initiative

Hello Folks,

It is harvest season, the time to enjoy the foods grown in your garden. And us Gardeners know that nothing beats the taste of fresh garden vegetables.

For those of you who attended NACC'S Conference in August, I hope you learned more about the Northern Healthy Foods Initiative and the various gardening and food security projects supported this year.

One way Northerners are addressing food security is by planting gardens. This year about forty (40) new gardens were established in Northern Manitoba Communities. This included community, family, school and individual plot gardens, as well as container gardening and raised garden beds. This past month I have been busy planning educational workshops. NACC will be hosting food preservation workshops in Pelican Rapids and Dauphin River at the end of September. Participants will have the opportunity to learn how to freeze vegetables, pickle, and make jam.

All participants will receive hands on instructions, take home information sheets and recipes, as well as get to take home a sample of what they learned. In addition the Community will also receive a basic canning kit in order to address the lack of canning equipment and supplies in the communities.

A "Preparing the Garden for winter" workshop is also scheduled in October for Berens River.

The Grants Are Coming! Are You Missing Out? The government is going green. This has an effect on all of us.

More grants and program information is available only online. For NACC communities this often means that awareness of grants, their requirements and the application forms is limited.

Did you know that of the \$4.5 Million given out by Manitoba's Community Places program this spring, only \$25,000 went to NACC communities? Many of the grants allow sweat equity, so communities can contribute their labour or skills. This in-kind value can really help when you need the numbers in the project's budget. Some programs want to see partnering. This means that you can ask one program for part of your funds and another for different items. For example, if a community wants to provide more recreation opportunities for the youth and others and need to upgrade the Hall, they can ask:

- -Community Places for up \$50,000 for building improvements including a new stove or dishwasher
- -Neighbourhoods Alive for funds from their different program, like community renewal, wellbeing and others
- -the RCMP Community Fund, up to \$10,000, provides funds for recreation equipment as a crime

prevention strategy.

Yes, matching and partnering can be a challenge, but it is worth it when the kids have things to do all summer.

If you aren't sure how to go about it, or what the deadlines are, we have created a handout about funding programs that are available, their requirements, deadlines and qualifying criteria. We will even help you send the forms if you can't access them online. We will even help you to make sure they are filled out correctly.

H1N1 KITS ARE COMING!

Dr. Catherine Cook, Executive Director of Aboriginal Health Programs, has been overseeing the creation of H1N1 Flu Kits. They will be shipped out to Community Council Offices. The kits will contain acetaminophen, for adults, children and infants; hand sanitizer and a thermometer. They will also have instructions about what to do if you think you, or someone in your family has the Flu.

The kits are meant to help community residents who may not have adequate supplies on hand.


Please remember to follow the guidelines for minimizing the transfer of germs during the upcoming Flu season:

- -Cough into a tissue, then immediately throw it into the garbage and wash your hands. Use the crook of your elbow if no tissues are available.
- -Wash your hands often and thoroughly.
- -Call the Health Centre, Nursing Station or a Health hotline if you think you have the Flu.
- -Stay home if you are ill with the Flu to help stop the spread of the Flu virus.

Candy Apples

Kids can't resist these crackling, crunchy, juicy candy apples, perfect for any fall birthday or celebration.

Ingredients

- 15 craft sticks
- 15 apples
- 2 cups white sugar
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1-1/2 cups water
- 8 drops red food coloring

Cooking Instructions

- 1. Lightly grease cookie sheets. Insert craft sticks into whole, stemmed apples.
- 2. In a medium saucepan over medium-high heat, combine sugar, corn syrup and water. Heat to 300 to 310 degrees F (149 to 154 degrees C), or until a small amount of syrup dropped into cold water forms hard, brittle threads. Remove from heat and stir in food coloring.
- 3. Holding apple by its stick, dip in syrup and remove and turn to coat evenly. Place on prepared sheets to harden.
