Before setting up:

Think about where your garden should go. Whether you grow indoors or out, you'll need to set up close to a power source for your automatic timers and /or lights. If there's no power source close by, consider using an extension cord to keep your garden running. Also keep in mind that your garden must be "level".



Thoughts about PH levels

Lots of questions about ph. This shows the nutrients and the optimum ph that a plant's roots can uptake the particular nutrient. So a ph of 5 ish to 7 ish is optimum for all the different nutrients. Don't get obsessed with ph!

Be excited! This will be a fun adventure and may in some ways be an experiment! Gardening is not a perfect science. If a seed fails, you can always try another.

Now with your excitement you may feel you want to grow as many different things as you can. I know I did! However, like any garden, size will limit what you can grow. I like to think of each "growing pod" as a piece of prime real estate, and they must all co exist within the same neighborhood. So that tomato plant you will want to grow, will grow very large and bushy and invade upon the other plants. So will the peppers and vines such as cucumbers and peas. Other plants will grow, but ever so slowly and therefore their production time may deter you from utilizing that "spot".

Be excited and willing to try lots of things, but also remember you will have time to try it all OVER time.
